

Hokura Jinja Shrine

[Higashinada Ward Motoyama-cho]

See the City and the sea spread out before you!

A 30-minute walk from the closest train station, Okamoto station. From the path to the shrine, you can see urban centre of Kobe, Rokko Island, and the Osaka Bay area in the distance.

The stone lanterns before the shrine's torii gate have from ancient times been used to wish for good luck upon sea voyages, and have served as a lighthouse for boats. The lanterns are known as "The Flame of Nada", and they continue to be lit every evening.

A relaxing spot to enjoy the scenery from high above

This park high up on the mountainside was originally a baseball field. From it, you can look out from the Osaka-Kobe area all the way to Suma, and Osaka Bay. Within the park there is a grassy open square, athletic and playground facilities and promenades. It has become beloved by Kobe's citizens as a place to relax.

This park is also the place where cherry blossom trees were planted as a memorial to the victims of the Great Hanshin Awaji Earthquake.

Kikuseidai

Just 15 minutes with the Maya Viewline, which connects the summit of Mt. Maya with the foot of the mountain. The viewing point at the summit is called Kikusedai, where you can see the cityscape which stretches from Kobe City all the way to Osaka, and at the same time take in Osaka Bay. In particular, this spot is very popular for its night scenery, as it is said to be one of Japan's three most beautiful nighttime views. Each year on new year's day many people stay on the mountain to see the first sunrise of the new year.

Rokko Island River Mall [Higashinada Ward Köyö-cho]

From the man-made Rokko Island, you can face Kobe city centre and the Rokko Mountain range. Alongside the Rokko Liner which runs through the centre of the island, the river mall lines a charming waterway, which in summer is lively with children playing in the water.

The atmosphere changes at night, with the lights all around giving the place an almost dreamlike atmosphere.

The Ishiyagawa riverside is lined with promenades and parks, with a view which stretches from Mt. Rokko in the North to the Sea-facing South.

Alongside the national highway is the Mikage Public Hall, which was built before the Second World War and has survived both wartime aerial bombing and the Great Hanshin Awaji Earthquake. The building underwent renovation in April 2017, and remains a landmark of the town, which maintains the style of the time it was built in.

Port Island Shiosai Park [Chuo Ward Minatojima]

From this park on Port Island's western coast you can see the city area, Port Tower, and the Rokko Mountain range from the sea, enabling you to really feel the atmostphere of the Port City of Kobe. The view at night time has been selected as one of Kobe's Top 10 City Centre night views, and the spot is popular as a place to enjoy the large firework festival which takes place over the water each August.

The observation deck of Mt. Suwa looks out over the Osaka Bay area, as well as the Port of Kobe and the city. The area has a "Love Monument", where it is said that if a couple attaches a lock to the monument, their love will last forever. The spot is also home to "Venus Bridge", which is in the shape of a heart, making a perfect accompaniment to the Love Monument. You can also enjoy a stunning view of Port Tower through the eye of the View Point Needle.

Egeyama Park

From many places in this spacious park, you can look over the cityscape from Port Island to Hyogo Canal Town. In addition, you can feel the historic atmosphere surrounding the site, with a stone memorial marking the place where famous samurai leader Masashige Kusunoki led his army in the 14th century Battle of Minatogawa. Egeyama park is popular for its Cherry Blossom trees, and in spring the place is bustling with people who come to view the blossoms.

Kōsanji Temple See Kobe's rural landscape and the Tamba Mountains in the Distance

From the mountain summit, which has a Kannondō (a religious structure dedicated to Kannon, the Buddhist goddess of mercy), there is a rural valley with rice fields forming steps up the side of the mountains. In the distance the landscape changes, with the rural foreground contrasting with the far-away residential apartment complexes, fruit and flower parks. Kōsanji and its forest are well known as symbols of Ōzō-cho, and the local citizens play a big role in working together to maintain it.

Mt. Takatori

A popular mountain climbing route close to the city!

Mount Takatori, with the main shrine of the Takatori-sect on its summit, has wonderful views of Kobe downtown, the Suma coast and Osaka Bay. On the approach to the shrine there are many small tea shops, making a great place for hikers to take rest on their way. Looking at the scenery through the Torii Gate, you can really feel the traditional Japanese atmosphere of Kobe, making it a wonderful spot to rediscover the charm of the city.

Mt. Oraga (Mt. Takakura)


From Mt. Takakura, known by its nickname of Mt. Oraga, the view stretches from Osaka all the way to Awaji island and the residential areas of Kobe's Suma and Tarumi Wards. Alongside the mountain path is a tea shop which has an observation deck with a panoramic view.

Hiking from Sumaura Park to Mt. Oraga is also a popular activity.

Sumaura Sanjo Yuen Park Revolving Observatory (Mt. Hachibuse) [Suma Ward Nishisuma]

A revolving observatory where you can enjoy view from Osaka all the way to the Akashi Suspension Bridge and Awaji!

From this revolving observatory on top of Mt. Hachibuse, to the east the view stretches from Suma Marine Park to Osaka, and to the west to

Shioya, Tarumi, Akashi Kaikyo Bridge and all the way to Awaji Island. The proximity of the sea, road and railways combine to create a scene which captures the essence of Suma.

In the park which you can visit via ropeway, there is a botanical garden and amusement park, which makes it perfect for families.

From the spacious observation platform which sits high up facing the sea, surrounded behind by the green of Mt. Hachibuse, the vast sea stretches into the distance. The site is also known as the location of the Ichinotani Battle of the Genpei War in the 12th century. This spot is very famous for its cherry blossoms, having been chosen as one of Kobe's Top 50 flower viewing spots, and in spring many people visit to view the flowers.

Azur Maiko

Be awed by the impressive Akashi Kaikyo Bridge!



This park – a restored Maikonohama beach – is a beautiful scenic spot for white sand and green pine trees. Visitors can see a magnificent view stretching from Awaji Island to Osaka Bay, with the pine tree forests of Maiko Park in the background. A place where visitors can see both the setting sun as it sinks into the sea, and the nighttime illuminations of the Akashi Kaikyo Bridge, it is a popular spot for photography. In addition, in summer many people visit to swim in the sea.

Mt. Mekko


A hidden spot for viewing the Akash Kaikyo Bridge!

From the grounds of Kande Shrine on the summit of the mountain lies a rural scene with a lake used for irrigation; it even has a hidden night spot where you can look out over Seishin Newtown, the Akashi Kaikyo Bridge and Awaji Island. Sandwiching the irrigation lake to the East and West lie a twin pair of mountains that are like two peas in a pod. The mountains are called Mt. Mekko and Mt. Okko, with Mekko meaning 'female hill' and Okko 'male hill' in Japanese. The mountains are well known by the locals, who call them 'Mekko-san' and 'Okko-san'.
